



GHARIAL



This is a photograph of a gharial, a crocodilian that lives in the Asian subcontinent. Another member of the crocodile family that fits into a different niche in the Nepalese river system is the Marsh Mugger.

The gharial and other members of the crocodile family do not have many human friends because of their fearsome reputation. Their armour plated bodies, their terrifying teeth and their reputation (often undeserved) for attacking people near rivers, combine to create a hostile image.

The gharial predominantly eats fish which puts them in competition with fishermen, who see these age-old inhabitants of these rivers as rivals for 'their' food! Furthermore, fishermen fear any crocodilian presence anywhere near the water's edge. Therefore like other crocodiles elsewhere in the world, the gharial is hunted and has its nests destroyed.

Captive breeding programmes and tougher law enforcement's have saved the gharial from extinction which proves that conservation efforts can be successful. FES has been to the Chitwan National Park and has studied the gharial captive breeding program in action, and has photographed them in their nearby natural habitats.

We need more captive breeding programmes such as the 'Gharial Project' to protect some of these crocodilians. Otherwise extinctions are inevitable.

In Brazil FES has visited a caiman refuge in the Pantanal region and has seen caiman being reared on special conservation farms. A variety of these projects can be successfully used for each species.

FES aims to help set up more crocodile projects and to work with the appropriate authorities to stop hunting and killing of gharial as well as overfishing of their prey species.
