TIGER

The tiger is truly wonderful and is probably the most popular animal in the world. There are five sub species of tiger, this one being the Royal Bengal Tiger, some of which live in Nepal.

The tiger has had huge swathes of its territories taken away by mankind, as people have needed ever more living space.

Moreover, as land is cleared, the trees that are cut down form part of an illegal international trade in timber. Poaching is another huge problem, even though tigers are protected by law in many countries. This is because tiger parts fetch high prices in black markets and the traditional Chinese medicine trade. Tiger numbers in the wild are incredibly low, probably only about 3,000 throughout the world. If they are not protected at all, they would become extinct in the wild within the next decade or so.

We need to protect the present nature reserves and the tigers living inside them, by giving extra powers and resources to park rangers. This increases their front-line war capabilities against poachers and illegal hunters.



FES has been to Nepal frequently and has tracked tigers in Bardia and Chitwan national parks. Some years ago Bardia rangers presented Andy Mydellton with a terracotta paw print in recognition of FES help. The tiger

is the FES and Wildlife Zone logo and a photograph taken by Andy Mydellton is on display at the Nepalese Embassy in London.

FES aims to conduct official tiger surveys in Nepal's national parks, as well as to replant many trees that have been previously cut down. This replanting scheme could also form part of the wildlife corridors that are needed to reconnect the national parks in the Terai Arc region of south Nepal. Furthermore the FES 'Chitwan Collaboration Project' includes a tiger swamp plan which will increase the quality of tiger habitat.
